The Fernandina Beach/Amelia Island/Yulee community once again has a federated garden club which offers residents the chance to share common gardening interests on a local, state and national level. The Florida Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. has chartered "The Bartram Garden Club" to serve residents of NE Florida who are interested in the fields of gardening and landscape design, environmental conservation, floral design and civic beautification. FFGC is a member of National Garden Clubs, Inc. which is headquartered in St. Louis, MO and supports federations in all 50 U.S. states and 200,000 international members.

In keeping with Fernandina's deep historical roots, the newly organized club has been named after the famed Colonial Naturalist, William Bartram, who visited Amelia Island in 1774, recording its natural flora and fauna. In commemoration a "William Bartram Trail" marker was erected at the intersection of Centre and Front Streets by the now defunct Rose Garden Club in cooperation with FFGC and the City of Fernandina Beach.

"Twenty-one Bartram Trail Markers have been erected at various sites in Florida," explains Beverly Williams, acting president of the new garden club. "All have been given to our state by local garden clubs. We wanted to keep alive Bartram's legacy. He discovered many plants and animals in Florida which were new to science at that time."

The club will conduct a "Meet and Greet" meeting at the Fernandina Branch Library on September 8 beginning at 10:00 a.m. Prospective members are cordially invited to attend. Anyone is eligible for membership who takes an active interest in gardening and is willing to promote the objectives of the club.

Beverly adds: "It's our goal to offer an enjoyable variety of educational, social and civic projects that attract a diverse membership. Joining a local garden club is a rewarding way to grow a green world while bettering the community and environment."

City proclaims September 16, 2016 Arbor Day

Mayor John A. Miller has proclaimed Friday, September 16, 2016 as Arbor Day in the city of Fernandina Beach, FL. In issuing his proclamation at the September 6, 2016 meeting of the Fernandina Beach City Commission, Miller invited the public to attend a tree planting ceremony at 10:00 a.m. that day at the Third Street Rail Yard, where the city is installing screening planting consisting of Southern Red Cedar and American Sweet Gum trees.

Miller said that the city is celebrating its 14th year as a designated Tree City USA community. He presented the proclamation to Reha London of the Bartram Garden Club and the Amelia Tree conservancy.





In accepting the proclamation, London called the recognition "serendipitous." She recounted her visit to City Hall during which she asked how to beautify the Third Street corridor leading into the city from Gum Street. She credited city Senior Planner Kelly Gibson with the idea of combining Arbor Day commemoration with a planting project that will help screen the railroad and industrial activities from the street.

London also announced that Fernandina Beach now has a federated garden club in the Bartram Garden Club. She invited the public to the club's first meet-and-greet at the Fernandina Beach Library at 10:00 a.m. this Thursday, September 8, 2016.

Proclamation

WHEREAS, in 1872, J. Sterling Morton proposed to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture that a special day be set aside for planting of trees, and

WHEREAS, the first Arbor Day was observed with the planting of more than a million trees in Nebraska and now observed throughout the nation and the world; and

WHEREAS, trees can reduce the erosion of our precious topsoil by wind and water, cut heating and cooling costs, moderate the temperature, clean the air, produce life-giving oxygen, and provide habitat for wildlife; and

WHEREAS, trees in our city increase property values, enhance the economic vitality of business areas, and beautify our community; and

WHEREAS, the City celebrates its 14th year as a designated Tree City USA community; and

WHEREAS, the City wishes to recognize the contributions towards continuing to maintain and improve the City's tree canopy made by Ms. Reha London of the Bartram Garden Club, and the Amelia Tree Conservancy; and

WHEREAS, Fernandina Beach observes Arbor Day each year in recognition of the importance of trees throughout our community.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, John A. Miller, by virtue of the authority vested in me as Mayor of the City of Fernandina Beach, Florida, do hereby proclaim Friday, September 16, 2016, as

"ARBOR DAY"

in Fernandina Beach, Florida, and urge all citizens to celebrate Arbor Day and to support efforts to protect our trees and woodlands.

Further, I urge all citizens to plant trees to gladden the heart and promote the well-being of this and future generations and encourage citizen to celebrate Arbor Day by attending the City's tree planting ceremony on Friday, September 16, 2016 at 10am at the 3rd Street Railyard where the City has installed a screening planting consisting of Southern Red Cedar and American Sweet Gum Trees.



THE BARTRAM GARDEN CLUB

The Bartram Garden Club is a civic and educational organization chartered in September 2016 to promote the love of gardening, floral design, and civic and environmental responsibility in Nassau County. The club is an affiliate of the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs (FFGC) under the umbrella of National Garden Clubs (NGC), headquartered in St. Louis, MO. Federated garden clubs network to promote service projects and community building through floral design, gardening and environmental studies.


In early 2016 FFGC District IV Director, Carolyn Stevens and Fernandina Beach resident, Beverly Williams, identified the need for a state garden club to serve Amelia Island and the greater Nassau County area. "Like myself, many residents were active in a federated club before moving here from another state," Beverly stated. "Most of us are learning how to navigate Florida's unique climate and soil. Others want to continue their floral design studies."

The Bartram Garden Club began with 26 charter members and was so named to recognize the legacy of Colonial naturalist, William Bartram, who set foot in Florida at Amelia Island in 1774. "We felt it was appropriate to acknowledge the role he played in NE Florida's history, having discovered many plants and animals here unknown to science at that time." In total, twenty-one Bartram Trail Markers have been dedicated at various sites in Florida by state garden clubs. One marker stands at the riverfront in downtown Fernandina Beach.

Service to the community is an important hallmark of the club. Members place a floral display on a rotating basis in the foyer of the Fernandina library, serve on the Design Council of Fernandina Main Street and lead garden therapy programs at a local assisted living facility. One member is actively identifying heritage trees within the City of Fernandina Beach. Another member initiated the idea to plant trees along South 3rd Street to screen the rail yard from view. The club hopes to soon sponsor NGC "Design

Study Units 1-6", a series of basic design workshops taught by FFGC instructors which will be offered to club members and open to the general public.

The club currently meets at the Fernandina Branch of the Nassau County Public Library the second Thursday of the month, September through May beginning at 10:00am. Programs alternate between design, horticulture and environmental topics. Guests and prospective members are always welcome. The above two sand castles were near the Ritz-Carton. Amelia Island during my walk on the Amelia Island beach. (Tuesday), Although we are all supposed to "Leave No Trace" on the beach, apparently a few guests decided to leave something pretty nice for me to

My walk is a slow 2-mile. 1-hour walk each day. I prefer the beach if not too hot, cold or windy. My second choice is the Amelia Island Parkway sidewalk, which connects to the A1A Amelia Island paved path. Living just north of American Beach, I am very lucky to have these two wonderful options for my daily walk.

The beach is my first preference for a walk because the ocean is beautiful and the beach is alive with people, birds and, occasionally, a few dolphins. Today, I saw a super flock of 60 pelicans flying in their graceful formation. Usually, I see a flock of only 15 to 20; I think 60 may

be all of our beach pelicans. Lots of toddlers were having fun playing in the wading pools left at low tide for small kids to enjoy. Lots of teenage girls were enjoying the waves hitting at their feet while clicking cellphone photos of each other. Many adults sat nearby in their beach chairs reading or texting while getting a sun tan.

My hour walk each day is a wonderful opportunity to get fresh air, exercise and enjoy the island; and it is also a necessary part of my medical treatment plan. We all need to keep movng to keep living. We all need to be able to walk, run or bicycle

Having paths to walk, run or

bicycle safely on is as important as having roads to drive on.

Over the past several years, with the help of federal and state grants, the city, county and state have worked together to help make significant improvements in our Amelia Island Trail Network. We now have about 50 miles of Amelia Island trails: some in our parks and some connecting our parks. See www.AmeliaIslandTrail.org for an island trail map or pick up a trail map flier at the Fernandina Beach Visitors Center in the train depot downtown. The next big trail improvement will be a new 10-foot-wide paved path along Simmons and Bailey roads across the island from the Atlantic Ocean to the Amelia River, funded with another federal grant.

After that, we need the city and county to work together to make a number of smaller improvements to enable safer trail access to downtown Fernandina Beach, as specified in a study done in 2016 by Sprinkle Consultants. That study was funded by the Regional Transportation Planning Organization. We have analyzed the 169-page Sprinkle study and sent a specific twopage proposal for acting on that study to both the city and county managers that I hope will be scheduled for consideration by the city and county commissions in the near future.

Our community team goal is to help make Amelia Island the best place in Florida to walk, run or bicycle safely.
